Press Release COVID-19 Death in Gallatin County

The Gallatin City-County Health Department is saddened to announce that one more Gallatin County resident has passed away from complications due to COVID-19.

This person was a male in his 60s who died in a hospital the week of December 26. The Gallatin City-County Health Department received the official death certificate this week that attributed his death to COVID-19. Out of respect for this man's family and friends, no further details will be released.

This latest death makes for a total of 108 COVID-related deaths in Gallatin County. Statewide data reported by the Montana Department of Public Health and Human Services can be found [here](#).

In Gallatin County, 61% of eligible residents are fully vaccinated. For additional details on vaccine metadata, [click here](#). From April 1, 2021 to January 8, 2022, Gallatin County saw 458 hospitalizations who were positive for COVID-19. Of those, 371 individuals were unvaccinated or approximately 81%. From April 1, 2021 to January 7, 2022 statewide, [MT DPHHS reported](#) 1,340 deaths were attributed to COVID-19. Of those deaths, 1,052 or 79% were unvaccinated.

You can find your COVID-19 vaccine at local pharmacies and clinics throughout the county. It is highly recommended that you make a plan to get fully vaccinated, including your booster dose if you are [eligible](#), to help protect yourself and others.
